



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

A Year in Review By the Numbers: 2/3/10/15/25

As another year passes, being AIPLA President has been the ride of a lifetime filled with incredible adventures.

First, from the President's desk, I want to thank our incredible Board, committee leaders, members, and our mind-blowing staff. I could not have managed, let alone succeeded, without these wonderful people guiding me, wrangling the issues, and making it all worthwhile.

Overall score – a personal success for me and a stunning year for AIPLA – (dare I say it?) - the strongest, most respected voice in Intellectual Property around the globe. (Okay, I'm biased. We are one of many, but I still think the best.)

It has been an honor to have taken my turn as caretaker of the President's chair; to be associated for over 30 years with some of the finest, smartest, and most dedicated professionals whom I am privileged to call not only colleagues, but friends; and an honor to follow in the footsteps of my predecessor, Brian Batzli. During the second year of the current Strategic Plan, we have continued to focus on FAME (Foundational, Advocacy, Membership, and Education). It is through this lens that I would like to share some of the successes of the organization, its members, and staff.

What does 2/3/10/15/25 mean?

On the **Advocacy** front, since I have become President, we have filed **2** briefs with the Federal Circuit (*Google LLC v. Sonos, Inc. and REGENXBIO Inc. v. Sarepta Therapeutics, Inc.*) and **3** briefs with the Supreme Court (Warner Chappell Music, Inc., et al. v. Sherman Nealy, et al., Cellect, LLC v. Vidal, and Dewberry Group, Inc. v. Dewberry Engineers, Inc.), we have visited over **15** countries to advance AIPLA's mission, and we have submitted over **25** comment letters to, e.g., the USTPO, the FTC, the WHO, WIPO, and the Copyright Office.

Our talented AIPLA volunteer members who serve on committees have spent countless hours promoting the interests of the IP community and contributing to the many AIPLA accomplishments. It is impossible to name all of the activities of every committee, but I want to draw your attention to some of our activities over the past year.

Consider that among other things, we have advocated on DOCX submission requirements, Patent Center and the retirement of EFS-Web and Private PAIR, Copyright Law and policy issues raised by artificial intelligence (AI) systems, the joint ITA-NIST-USPTO collaboration initiative regarding Standards, the Promoting and Respecting Economically Vital American Innovation Leadership Act (PREVAIL), the Patent Eligibility Restoration Act (PERA), genetic resources and associated traditional knowledge, Right to Repair, March-In Rights, the WHO Pandemic Agreement, group registration of two-dimensional artwork, inventorship for AI-Assisted Inventions, innovation to the marketplace, trademark fees, patent fees, examining Means-Plus-Function and Step-Plus-Function claim limitations, the Design Law Treaty, terminal disclaimer practice, the impact of the proliferation of AI on prior art, the experimental use exception, and various Patent Trial and Appeal Board (PTAB) issues including expanding opportunities to appear before the PTAB, Director review of PTAB decisions, and PTAB rules for briefing discretionary denial issues. (That adds another 20+ deliverables to the AIPLA numbers, but I am sure I left out a few things because, frankly, our volunteer members do so much work that it's hard to keep track!)

We are making efforts to foster communication with the Copyright Office and the USPTO (through, for example, the Copyright Law Committee, the Patent-Relations with the USPTO Committee, and Trademark-Relations with the USPTO Committee). Our ongoing efforts have involved AIPLA patent practitioner members engaging with USPTO Under Secretary and Director Kathi Vidal, Patent Commissioner Vaishali Udupa, Register of Copyrights Shira Perlmutter, and several senior USPTO staff. This dialogue has allowed AIPLA to be more effective in partnering to identify and resolve issues and create opportunity to be more proactive with government decision makers.

On the **Membership** front, with the help of the Diversity in IP Law Committee, we held a Colloquium on "Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility (DEIA) in the Intellectual Property Environment." Along with our cosponsors ASIPI (Inter-American Intellectual Property Association), IPIC (Intellectual Property Institute of Canada), and Invent Together, we considered issues of equality in the IP ecosystem. We focused on three perspectives . . . those that are government IP-related, IP Professionals-related, and inventors-related. The guidepost for our discussions was the phrase: *Diversity is a Fact; Inclusion is a Choice*. The Colloquium speakers included DEIA professionals from around the world, including DEIA experts representing national and international intellectual property offices, associations, and law firms, as well as law school professors and leading independent opinion leaders. Speakers shared personal, firsthand experiences in an open-minded environment.

We have expanded opportunities to reach out to students, through the AIPLA's Law School Link program, which provides students at participating law schools access to valuable added AIPLA benefits. Importantly, AIPLA membership is now free of charge for students! Our newly emerging membership base can also take advantage of special discounts and pricing on events and webinars and access to member-only material; and participation in over 60 AIPLA committees. The Membership Committee has been empowering current members to reach out to new practitioners, particularly those who have recently passed the USPTO patent bar, to let them know about the programs and activities of AIPLA.

We continue to have a strong Mentoring Committee and Women in IP Law Committee who reach out to our members in various ways, including through mentor/mentee pairings, mentoring clusters, and networking and outreach events. This past year, the USPTO and AIPLA partnered to provide mentorship to AIPLA members and participants of the USPTO's Empowering Women's Entrepreneurship -- a community-focused, collaborative, and creative initiative to encourage and empower more women founders across America. The program included three webinars and one concluding networking event focusing on Intellectual Property law topics, advice from AIPLA's women entrepreneurs, and the opportunity to participate in a mentoring group of women with varying skills and experiences. The Patent Agents Committee has also been extremely active in creating and providing educational resources and professional development opportunities to Patent Agent members and the broader AIPLA community. The members of the Committee focus on developing a better understanding of the role played by Patent Agents in all aspects of acquiring and managing a patent portfolio, and advocating for Patent Agent

member's interests within, and valuable contributions to, the intellectual property community.

On the **Education** front, AIPLA continues to provide second-to-none educational opportunities for all IP practitioners. All our committees participate in programing opportunities from the Annual and Spring Meetings to the Road Shows on-line CLE programs to the Corporate Committee's brown-bag lunches and the Patent Agents Committee luncheon programs; from the Trade Secret Law Summit to the Women in IP Committee's breakfast and global networking event – the list goes on and on.

AIPLA's International Committees work to establish and maintain relations with IP-related professional societies in regions and countries around the world. Committee members study international IP laws and practices, report on issues of interest to AIPLA's Board of Directors and membership and provide comment letters to various agencies in foreign jurisdictions. Of note, committee members organize trips to various regions of the world, which provide great educational and relationship-building experiences. These trips are incredible and open to any interested members.

And last, but not least, on the **Foundational** front, AIPLA members and staff work diligently at analysis of AIPLA programs, services, and initiatives, identifying areas for expansion, contraction, or modification based on their success and the available or anticipated resources. The Board-level Foundational Committee is in the process of analyzing the committee structure and mission-critical activities to make participation more relevant and accessible to members, and to ensure that the committees support the organization's mission-based goals.

Back to the Numbers - What does "10" in 2/3/10/15/25 mean?

We could not have accomplished so much this year without a strong foundation, which was created by strong leaders. This year Kim Van Voorhis takes up the gavel as our 10th female President – 10 female Presidents over the past 26 years. Starting in 1998, with Meg Boulware as our first female President, AIPLA has accomplished something few bar associations have accomplished – 10 females at the top-most volunteer position. While I do not want to diminish the accomplishments of all the Past Presidents, I want to shed a light on the fact that AIPLA was implementing actions to create diverse leadership long ago. Syntel Sterling Best Shores Mauritius Limited.*



AIPLA Files Amicus Brief in Dewberry Group, Inc. v. Dewberry Engineers, Inc.

AIPLA Comments on Withdrawal of Changes to the Post Registration Response Deadlines

Arlington, VA. August 19, 2024 - The American Intellectual Property Law Association (AIPLA) submitted comments to the USPTO on their recent Withdrawal of Changes to Post Registration Response Deadlines.

Capitol Hill

AIPLA has been active on Capitol Hill, meeting with both The Senate and The House of Representatives Congressional Offices on various IP legislation. AIPLA has attended Hearings held by the Senate Judiciary Committee, Subcommittee on Intellectual Property and the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Courts, Intellectual Property, and the Internet on The Patent Eligibility Restoration Act, The NO FAKES Act, Artificial Itelligence, Examining Competition in the Prescription Drug Market, and more.

Government Agencies

AIPLA has been actively involved with various government agencies that engage on IP issues, including the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), the U.S. Copyright Office, the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), among others.

This year, AIPLA, with the help of its subject matter committee experts, have filed comments to the USPTO on Expanding Opportunities to Appear Before the PTAB, Trademark and Patent Fees, Resources for Examining Means-Plus-Function and Step-Plus-Function Claim Limitations, WIPO Diplomatic Conference on the Design Law Treaty, and more. We filed comment letters to the Copyright Office on Group Registration of Updates to a News Website and Two-Dimensional Artwork, and to NIST on March-In-Rights.

AIPLA collaborated with the USPTO to conduct a four-part series providing mentorship to AIPLA members and participants of the USPTO's Empowering Women's Entrepreneurship - a community-focused, collaborative, and creative initiative to encourage and empower more women founders across America. Our Copyright Law Committee members also had the opportunity to visit the Copyright Office to meet with Register of Copyrights and Director of the U.S. Copyright Office, Shira Perlmutter, as well as representatives from the Office of Public Information and Education (PIE), the Office of Policy and International Affairs (PIA), and the Office of Registration Policy and Practice (RPP).

International Outreach

IP Practice in Israel

Given the ongoing geopolitical challenges Israel is facing, this committee was fairly subdued this year. They did however participate in the Women's Global Networking event in April and have tentative plans for a delegation trip in March 2025.

IP Practice in China

The IP Practice in China Committee held regular monthly meetings with guest speakers from the China team at the USPTO and leading Chinese law firms. Two of their past meetings were joint meetings – one with the AIPPI committee and one with the Standards & Open Source committee. The committee is currently planning their first trip to China including visits to CNIPA, the Supreme People's Court, the Beijing IP Court, and others.

IP Practice in the Asia Pacific

For the 2023 – 2024 term, the highlight of the AIPLA IP Practice in the Far East Committee (now the "IP Practice in the Asia Pacific Committee") was its annual delegation trip to Asia. This year, in April 2024, the committee traveled to Thailand, where it met with the Thailand Department of Intellectual Property and the Thailand Central IP and International Trade Court (CIPITC). The delegation then traveled on to Taiwan, where they met with the Taiwan Intellectual Property Office (TIPO), Taiwan IP and Commercial Court (IPCC), Taiwan Fair Trade Commission, and the Taiwan Patent Attorney Association (TWPAA). During the trip, the delegation also had memorable visits to the Royal Palace in Thailand and a river cruise in Bangkok, as well as a city tour of Taipei with visits to historic sites. AIPLA President Ann Mueting led the delegation, along with past President Patrick Coyne.

In the fall of 2024, in coordination with the AIPLA Online Programs Committee, the Committee is organizing a webinar on ADR in the IP sector featuring the Singapore International Arbitration Center (SIAC) and the Intellectual Property Office of Singapore (IPOS). This webinar follows the successful webinar the committee organized in late 2023 in coordination with the AIPLA Emerging Technologies Committee and the ASEAN IP Association regarding AI in the patent sector. Also of note, was that in late 2024, the IP Practice in the Far East Committee officially changed its name to the IP Practice in the Asia Pacific Committee, and will soon be launching Korea, Taiwan and India Subcommittees.

IP Practice in Japan

One of the highlights this year was the IP Practice in Japan's delegation trip to Japan in the Spring. They visited the Japan Patent Office (JPO), AIPPI-Japan, Japan Federation of Bar Associations (JFBA), Licensing Executive Society (LES-J), IP High Court, Japan Trademark Association (JTA), Japan Patent Attorney Association (JPAA), and Japan Intellectual Property Association (JIPA). They also traveled to Osaka and hosted a reception at the Roppongi Hills Club. The committee also enjoyed karaoke with Japanese friends and colleagues (and maybe a little sake!).

IP Practice in Europe

The IP Practice in Europe Committee's most significant activity was its annual European delegation which this year visited Munich, Paris, and London. They met with the EPO, the EPO Board of Appeals, the Central Division of the UPC, EUIPO, and many private patent groups across these three countries. In addition, the committee held monthly meetings to keep members up to date on European IP practice. When needed, they prepared position papers on various European IP issues. They also partnered with various IP industry groups and held joint CLE programs with other AIPLA committees to benefit members and increase their knowledge and skill when dealing with IP issues in Europe.

IP Practice in Latin America

This year, the committee was been busy organizing several key activities. On March 13, they hosted a webinar on "Expedited Patent Prosecution in Latam.". On May 16, they held a panel on "Amendments/Divisional Applications in Patent Prosecutions in Peru, Brazil, and Mexico" during the Spring meeting. And, in August, they organized a trip to Chile and Argentina.

AIPPI-US

The AIPPI-U.S. was originally founded as a non-profit organization in 1930 and has approximately 300 members. Membership in AIPPI-US automatically includes membership in AIPPI. The United States has one of the largest representations on the International Executive Committee - the principal decision-making body of AIPPI.

AIPLA Report of the Economic Survey
